Many Paths, One Faith: Embracing Unique Journeys with Christ

No matter your age, background, or experience, everyone walks a unique path to God. And that's exactly how it's meant to be.

For some Christians, it can feel intimidating to see others who seem further along in their faith. But scripture and experience remind us: no two journeys with Christ are the same. Each one is personal, purposeful, and precious in God's eyes.

According to the Pew Research Center, "In recent years, 33% of the world's babies were born to Christians." Many are raised in the faith from birth—like Marlene Arellano, FPC's Director of Worship—while others find God later in life, sometimes after winding and difficult paths. Each story, though different, points to the same grace.

Arellano recalls her early commitment to Christ with clarity and conviction.

"I became a Christian, I remember vividly, at the age of five... One day, the pastor was preaching about salvation, and at my mere five years old, I knew I was the sinner, and I knew I wanted to give God my life... I surrendered my life to Jesus that day."



Chrystopher Sahgal's journey looks very different, yet is no less powerful. He remembers his first encounter with God as a child—his baptism as a Catholic.

"It's my earliest childhood memory. I have no idea why I can remember my infant baptism, but it was confirmed by my mom because there's no photos of it."

Sahgal acknowledges that community plays a key role in building a relationship with God—something he once lacked.

"I look back and think, if I had had a better relationship [with God]... and had that guidance, you know, that you get in community, there's a lot of decisions I wouldn't have made."

God made Himself known to Sahgal at a critical point in his life. "I felt more alone than I ever had, and so I just prayed... I heard God's audible voice, and He said, 'Come home.' I knew He wasn't talking about moving back to LA or anything like that. He was talking about [FPC]."

That turning point began to transform his life."I started coming [to FPC], and little by little, that feeling of loneliness-of being lost-was gone."

For sophomore Savion Thomas, baptism became a meaningful milestone in his spiritual journey. "I wanted to be more one with God and have my sins forgiven," Thomas said, explaining what led him to take the step of baptism.


Arellano, too, emphasizes the power of consistent involvement in the church community. "I've always had a very strong conviction and a very strong faith in God because I was involved in church," she shares.

Each of these stories highlights an essential truth: faith is not a competition. As Galatians reminds us, we are not called to compare, but to grow.

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

— Galatians 3:28



Street Life Ministries: Where Faith Meets the Street

Together, and in close collaboration with Pastor Scott Dixon of First Christian Church of Palo Alto, we've supported Street Life's mission to bring hope, healing, and the love of Christ to those experiencing homelessness and addiction across the Peninsula.



Who They Are

Street Life Ministries believes in the transformative power of the Gospel, and in the ability of community to change lives. While not affiliated with a specific denomination, the organization's foundation is deeply biblical and theologically rich.

They hold to the essentials of historic Christianity:

- Belief in the Triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- The Bible as the inspired Word of God and final authority for Christian life and faith
- The saving work of Jesus Christ through His death and resurrection
- The empowerment of believers through the Holy Spirit to fulfill their unique, God-given purpose
- The Church as the living Body of Christ, called to love, grow, and serve

Street Life Ministries (cont)

As members of various local congregations, those involved in Street Life strive to live out these beliefs with a focus on service. They are dedicated to what the Church does best: proclaiming Scripture, cultivating healing, encouraging citizenship, and building loving, Christ-centered relationships.

What They Do

Street Life Ministries serves meals six times a week at multiple locations, offering more than food —they offer fellowship. Each gathering is centered around:

- Teaching of the Word
- Breaking of bread
- Community prayer
- Meaningful relationships

In addition to meals, they provide essential life resources like clothing, hygiene items, and transportation assistance. But their ultimate goal is wholeness—physical, emotional, and spiritual—for every individual they encounter.

A Life Transformed: Anthony's Story

One of the most powerful testaments to the mission of Street Life Ministries is the story of Anthony, a Philadelphia native whose life was once marked by addiction, incarceration, and hopelessness.

After years of bouncing between treatment centers in Florida and California, Anthony found himself in Orange County at another dead end. It was there he met a girl whose father worked with Street Life Ministries. The father reached out repeatedly, encouraging Anthony to get help. Eventually, Anthony agreed to travel with him to the Bay Area.

That decision changed everything.

Upon arriving, Anthony was introduced to David Sheeran of Street Life Ministries. David didn't just offer encouragement—he offered a hotel room, helped Anthony connect to AA meetings, and introduced him to a church and a circle of supportive Christian men.

Through that network and the strength of community, Anthony fully embraced the 12 steps of recovery for the first time. With a sponsor, accountability, and faith, he has now achieved over two years of sobriety, the longest in his life.

"David didn't just give me a room
—he gave me a new start,"
Anthony shared. "The men I met
through Street Life became my
mentors, my brothers. I wouldn't
be here without them."

Today, Anthony works as a case manager at Life Moves, helping others struggling with addiction find the same hope he discovered.

"I know what it's like to feel lost," he says. "Now I get to be someone else's David."

The Heart of the Ministry

At its core, Street Life Ministries exists to share God's love in tangible ways—one meal, one prayer, one person at a time. Through consistent outreach, deep spiritual commitment, and a community of believers, this ministry is shining Christ's light in the darkest corners of our neighborhoods.

Whether through a warm plate of food or a relationship that restores dignity and purpose, Street Life Ministries reminds us all that no one is beyond the reach of God's grace. More Than a Trip: Living Love and Faith in San Bartolo

When I close my eyes and think of community, I can't help but picture the bright faces and open arms of our brothers and sisters in San Bartolo, Mexico. What started for Sandra and an unconventional honeymoon in 2018 has become a sacred rhythm of returning—this year will mark my fourth trip. Each visit draws us deeper into a shared life of love, faith, and mutual service. The hospitality we're shown by the San Bartolo community, and especially our host families, is vlamis inspiring.

From the moment we land in Mexico City, we are met by a familiar face, whether that is Juan Carlos, who used to lead the church, or Rene (now a part of the church's leadership team, which consists of Luci, Rene, Rodrigo, Israel, and Crisel). Their warm welcome transforms what could be an overwhelming arrival into something deeply comforting. Whether we travel to San Bartolo in a shuttle bus or a car, the feeling is the same: we are going home.

We settle in with host families who now feel like relatives. My hosts—Rodrigo, Naelle, and Amanda—have become a second family. I've watched Amanda grow from a shy five-year-old with a pit bull puppy named Canelo to a confident preteen (with a much bigger dog). After years apart due to COVID, Canelo still remembered me—tail wagging and leaping with joy—and Amanda calling me "uncle" moved me in ways I can't explain.

Each day, after digging gardens, buildina fences. re-roofing outdoor bathrooms, or planting seeds, we're nourished not only by incredible meals but by the spirit of togetherness around the table. Lunch in Mexico is the heartiest meal, and after a long day of service, it's a true gift to sit down one family in Christ. I particularly look forward Naelle's home-cooked meals when we get home at night.

Of course, our days aren't all work. One day is set aside for rest and exploration—pyramids, churches, and local markets. But perhaps the most joyful evening of all is at a small local Italian restaurant. where Lucy and other church members perform live music. Last year, Lucy invited Larry Frame to join her on stage to sing a requested song—and he did! It was a moment of laughter, surprise, and beautiful harmony that none of us will forget.

Teresa's favorite memory is a perfect snapshot of the trip's joy and depth. But beneath the fun hard. holv lies work. remembers weeding gardens, sealing rooftops, and most importantly, witnessing real transformation—like Wendv's father, who came to Christ and is now stewarding a large garden that feeds many.



These small miracles are echoed in Jim's reflections on hesed (lovinakindness) and emeth (faithfulness), Hebrew words that capture the spirit of what we are called to bring—and receive—in San Bartolo.

Jim shared stories of Wendy and Emiliano, children who spent their days with the mission team because their parents worked long hours. Angel, а boy developmental challenges, lit up with joy when someone gave him his first pair of leather shoes. And there were Dan and his two brothers, teenagers who, despite the lure of cartel money, chose the path of faith and fellowship through the church.

These are the people and stories that keep pulling us back. Not out of pity, but because we see God at work in their lives, and we are invited to join in. As Pastor Dennis often reminds us, church is not just a Sunday thing, and in San Bartolo, we live that truth.

Worship is not confined to pews. It flows through shared meals, laughter, scripture study, and acts of service. Some years, we gather for nightly devotions. Other times, we're invited to preach or pray with the local church. Every time we leave, we change—we become more aware of God's presence, more committed to His work, and more alive in our faith.

This year's trip will take place July 18-28. If you've ever felt a nudge to go deeper, to stretch your faith, or simply to love more widely, pray about joining us.

It's more than a trip. It's an invitation to live out God's hesed and emeth in a community that welcomes you as one of their own.
