What is Ash Wednesday?

Christians all around the world are going to church on Wednesday, March 5 for Ash Wednesday, which is the beginning of Lent and symbolizes repentance through ashes that are drawn on the congregation's foreheads.

On Ash Wednesday, there is a very solemn service followed by ashes being drawn on the people's foreheads in a cross design. The Bible intertwines ash and dust with the simplicity of humankind.

"By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food until you return to the ground since from it you were taken; for dust you are and to dust you will return," Genesis 3:19 says.

However, here at FPC, the ashes don't just magically appear. Christopher Gunaseelan, the elder of Christian Education for Adults, helps out by burning the palm leaves and preparing the ashes.

"We collect the palm leaves from Palm Sunday and we save it," Gunaseelan said. "We have a small fire pit that we can burn it [the palm leaves] in...once it's burnt, I have to sift through it...so only fine ashes get collected."

Afterward, Gunaseelan mixes the ashes with olive oil to get a perfect consistency. Although the preparation of the ashes is important to the holiday, Ash Wednesday is very symbolic and holds a lot of meaning to the Christian community.

The Catholic Spirit writes that "when we come forward to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday, we are saying that we are sorry for our sins and that we want to use the season of Lent to correct our faults, purify our hearts, control our desires and grow in holiness so we will be prepared to celebrate Easter with great joy."

The ritual of drawing ashes on foreheads isn't a new, modern tradition- it was commanded by the Lord in the Bible as well!

"And the Lord said to him, "Pass through the city, through Jerusalem, and put a mark on the foreheads of the men who sigh and groan over all the abominations that are committed in it," Ezekiel 9:4 says.

This renowned Christian holiday holds many meanings, and although it can be deciphered in various ways with different people, its fundamentals are the same. Christianity.com writes, "The ashes that are worn on the forehead on Ash Wednesday symbolize two main things: death and repentance."

The Bible reinforces Christianity.com's writings as well. "Then I turned my face to the Lord God, seeking him by prayer and pleas for mercy with fasting and sackcloth and ashes," Daniel 9:3 says.

Martha. compassionate а caregiver who works with was faced with a children. terrifying moment when one of her students, who suffers from severe seizures, became unresponsive during a classroom episode. "I knew something was wrong," Martha said. "The child could tell the seizure was coming, and told me I see lights." She did everything she had been trained to do, but it wasn't enough. Amid the confusion and urgency, with paramedics on their way and the child unresponsive, Martha found herself in a moment of deep despair.

Feeling overwhelmed, Martha turned to prayer. "I just had to ask Jesus, Please don't take this child from us...". Though the child remained unconscious as he was transported the hospital, to something unusual caught Martha's attention as she stood in the room where the child had been. "I noticed a small statue of Jesus by where the boy had been lying," Martha recalled. "I asked everyone in the room, even the paramedics, but no one knew where it had come from."

In that moment, Martha felt an overwhelming sense of peace, believing the statue was a sign from God. "That was when I knew," she said. "It was God's message to me, showing that He was there with us." Miraculously, the young boy regained consciousness at the hospital and is now recovering. To God we give all the glory!

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CLOSING LETTER

Congregation,

This month, we embark on a new endeavor with the launch of our monthly newsletter. Chrys is leading this effort, so if you have an announcement or something to contribute, please pass it along to him.

Last summer, I had the incredible opportunity to study C.S. Lewis in Oxford, England, at his home, "The Kilns," located just a few miles outside the city center. There, I spent time with resident scholars specializing in Lewis' work, as well as a visiting scholar from Wheaton College. While I had read Lewis before and enjoyed his books on theology and fantasy-such as The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe-I must admit that I didn't fully grasp the depth and meaning behind his writings. However, after that experience and reading dozens of books analyzing his work, I have come to appreciate his sheer brilliance and profound gift for storytelling and theology. Listening to recordings of his messages or reading his books, it becomes clear why he is so widely respected across the world.

Recently, someone sent me a video about four things to pray to the Holy Spirit before bed. I found it meaningful and wanted to share a summary with you:

1) Invite the Holy Spirit into your

life. Acknowledge your desire for the Spirit's work and remember that this is not a passive relationship. The Spirit is actively working—even as we sleep.

2) Ask the Spirit to reveal any unconfessed or hidden sin. This is not about shame or condemnation but about refinement, drawing us closer to the Trinity and the Kingdom. We continually need grace to be at work in our lives.

3) Seek the Spirit's guidance through your sleep. Ask for preparation for the next day's

troubles, pressures, and blessings. The Spirit is not bound by time past, present, or future—and can prepare, correct, empower, and transform us.

4) Give thanks for the Spirit's presence. As we recently read in 1 Thessalonians 5:18, "Give thanks in everything, for this is the will of God." Often, we think of giving thanks to the Father and the Son, but how often do we thank the Spirit? I calculated that since my conversion, the Holy Spirit has been with me for 36,882,000 minutes—through every high and low, every joy and sorrow. How often have I stopped to say, "Thank you"?

Jesus told us that He was giving us a gift until the end of time—the presence of the Holy Spirit—

to better our lives, to liberate us, and to transform us into the image of Christ. If nothing else, we should be grateful.

So, next time you get ready to sleep, try these four prayers and see how your life changes. I know I'm going to try.
